The promise of lazy summer days on the California Delta beckons campers, anglers and RV'ers to the small towns and resorts dotting the sloughs. The charm of the Delta is the decidedly laid back-Huck Finn kind of existence that is enjoyed for a weekend, a vacation, or for the lucky ones, a lifetime. With over 1,000 miles of waterways, the Delta offers an abundance of outdoor activities.

This article offers a sampling of camping, RV'ing, and boating opportunities in and near Rio Vista.

#### Delta Marina Yacht Harbor & RV Park

Delta Marina Yacht Harbor and RV Park is a gem tucked away in the corner of Rio Vista. Park staff often hear visitors say, "We never knew you were here! This is a great place!" The RV Park has 25 sites with 13 right on the Sacramento River, the rest tucked under mature shade trees with a view of the marina. The marina has nearly 800 feet of docking space, making it one of the largest guest docks in the Delta. The Point restaurant shares the property and offers some great food and a river view. #### Sandy Beach County Park

Sandy Beach County Park at the south end of Rio Vista is open year-round. The park offers a 24-hour boat launch, campsites, picnic grounds, and a sand beach. Be safe

and heed the no swimming allowed sign at the beach. Campers can enjoy an early morning walk to watch the sunrise over the Sacramento River or, maybe, breakfast in downtown Rio Vista. The campground includes picnic tables, barbeque pits, hot showers, flush toilets and an RV dump station. Each of the 42 individual campsites has hook-ups for electricity and water. #### **Brannan Island State Recreation Area**

Brannan Island State Recreation Area has something to offer every type of camper. RVs have access to 12 sites with water and electric hookups and a nearby sanitation station. Walk-in campers find 13 sites with drinking water and restrooms close by. There is even a small hike-in cabin. Boaters appreciate the 32 boat-in camping slips that can take boats up to 35 feet long and 10 feet wide. The six group sites accommodate RVs up to 36 feet long. Picnic areas stretch along Seven and Three Mile Sloughs. **Duck Island RV Park and Fishing Resort** 

Duck Island RV Park and Fishing Resort is an adult-only park on the Sacramento River across from Rio Vista. The



troubles of life melt away as you sit under a shade tree and look west across the Sacramento River watching a Delta sunset. The resort offers six lighted fishing docks so you can fish day or night. Or if you prefer, you can fish off the manicured grassy bank, which is two football fields long. There are 51 sites, each having hookups for water, sewer, and 30/50 AMP electrical service. Facilities include a clubhouse with a

kitchen and meeting room, RV supplies, fish bait and free ice available on site! For directions and information call

#### Snug Harbor

Snug Harbor covers 10+ acres of the Snug Harbor peninsula off Ryer Island on Steamboat Slough about 10 minutes from Rio Vista, via the Real McCoy II Ferry. You may need to take an alternative route if you have a large RV. The familyoriented resort offers RV'ers waterfront

and water-view RV sites with 30/50 AMP electrical service. Picnic table and barbeques are provided at each site. Most of



the waterfront sites have sewer hookups and accommodate any size RV with any number of slide-outs. Tent campers might enjoy a view at Snug Cove, as six of the ten sites are facing the cove. Snug Harbor offers boaters protection from the sometimes-harsh wind and currents. thanks to the high levees of Ryer and Grand Islands. Overnight guests can dock at the marina and enjoy a clean bathroom and a hot shower. For directions and

Delta Loop

One last outdoor treasure to mention is The Delta Loop, known locally as "The Loop." An area about 10 minutes east of Rio Vista on state Route 12, many families enjoy their summer holidays there. The Delta Loop area boasts several wonderful RV resorts, marinas, hidden restaurants and great fishing.

Since the Gold Rush, the Delta soil has nurtured a rich agricultural heritage. Over the years the crops grown have varied. Where tomatoes once thrived, it is now common to see field after field of wine grapes, producing some of the best wines in California.

Three wineries epitomize the growth of the wine industry in the Delta.



Bogle Winery

#### **Bogle Winery**

The largest is Bogle Winery just south of Clarksburg nestled by Elk Slough west of the Sacramento River. Bogle is a family operation spanning six generations of farming. The first vineyard of 8 acres was planted in 1968 and now grows Petite Sirah, Chardonnay and Merlot grapes on 110 acres surrounding the winery, tasting room and picnic area. A majority of the grapes come from several vineyards in the Delta. Bogle also sources grapes from Lodi, El Dorado and Amador counties, all known for their Zinfandel, Merlot, Syrah and lesser known grapes used for blending. Other sources include the Russian River, Mendocino, Monterey and Oakley, assuring a rich fusion of flavors. Bogle prides itself on growing sustainably and 62% of their grapes are in the Certified Green Program. Vineyards and wineries in the program take a stewardship approach, integrating holistic and environmental management practices into every step of the growing and winemaking process.

Bogle's tasting room is located on Yolo County Road 144, off South River Road. The shaded picnic area begs the visitor to buy a bottle and spend some quiet time soaking up the ambiance of the vinevards. The tasting room is open 7 days a week. Find them at www.boglewinerv.com.

#### **Scribner Bend Vineyards**

In 1893, George Scribner began farming at a bend in the Sacramento River south of Freeport, which became known as "Scribner Bend."

The winemaking evolved from their farming experience. Now Scribner Bend Vineyards grows 60 acres of estate wine grapes. A barrel and crushing facility was added in 2007.

Taste Six Hands wines at Wine Social located at 7 North School Street in Lodi. See www.winesocial.com for hours. The winery hosts several events per year at the winery near Walnut Grove at 13783 Isleton Road. These include a Picnic in the Vineyard in June and chocolate/wine pairings in the spring. Find them at www.sixhandswinery.com.

The historic 1918 barn has been transformed into the tasting room, a meeting space, bridal loft and offices. The site now includes a 50' x 60' tent with chandeliers and a fireplace for weddings and events.

Scribner Bend creates some unique and delicious wines, including Black Hat Tempranillo, a rich red that pairs perfectly with barbeque meats. Their Pinot Grigio is a rich fruit dominant white wine; the bottle is graced with a Delta painting by renowned Sacramento artist Gregory Kondos. Scribner Bend also produces a sparkling, pleasingly sweet, almond wine. Their tasting room is open Fridays through Sundays 11:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Find them at www.scribnerbend.com.

#### **Six Hands Winery**

The third winery has deep roots in the Delta and Rio Vista. The Marks family has been farming and making wine for more than 100 years. As an interesting local note, the Trilogy subdivision outside of Rio Vista is built on the old Marks Ranch and the old farmhouse is on Highway 12 near Church Road. In the beginning of the 20<sup>th</sup> century Joseph Machado first farmed along the Sacramento River near Walnut Grove where the winery is now located. Joseph's

great-great-grandson Peter Marks was inspired to learn the family secrets of winemaking. In 1994, Syrah and Viognier grapes were planted at the home ranch. Six Hands Winery was launched in 1997 by Peter, his wife Richele and his father Norman. Now, the entire family is involved in creating their fine boutique wines. The Delta microclimate

is ideal for growing grapes, with its warm temperatures drawing the cool breezes from the Pacific. As Delta farmers. Six Hands is committed to sustainable farming and preserving the land, along with their growing partners in the Delta and Lodi. The winery produces 16 small batch blends from 11 varietals.

This is just a small sample of wine tasting options in the Delta. Drive the road on both sides of the Sacramento River between Rio Vista, Clarksburg and Freeport to experience the rich agricultural heritage that is the Delta.

## HÍSTORÍC Anthony W. Dozier House – Main Street By Phil Pezzaglia Photos from the Rio Vista Museum

#### The Dozier Era

One vacant piece of property, located in the 400 block of Main Street, seems to always spark questions regarding its history. Has it always been a vacant lot or was it once the location of a fine stately home? The answer — from 1869 to around 1955 one of the finest two-story homes in Rio Vista occupied the grounds. Built and occupied originally by the Dozier family, the home changed hands several times during its eighty-six

year existence.

Arriving in 1868 the Dozier family was one of the largest families to settle in the Rio Vista area. The family consisted of the parents', Anthony and Mary, and six of their ten children. Several of these children became involved in businesses in and around Rio Vista, Toland Landing and the Montezuma Hills.

The Dozier family had their roots in Georgetown, Williamsburg

County, South Carolina, where all nine brothers fought on the side of the Confederacy. During the Reconstruction Period after the Civil War, the family left its plantation in 1869 and decided to relocate out west,

choosing Rio Vista and Toland Landing as their home. The family was familiar with the area through correspondence with Dr. H. H. Toland, who had relocated from the Carolinas a few years prior.

Soon after arriving, the Dozier clan built a large family home erected on the southeast corner of Main and Fifth Street and completed in 1869. Several of the Dozier children became prominent in the day-to-day life of Rio Vista. Leonard operated a medical practice; Melville taught at the Public School; Edward was

the ranch manager for Dr. Toland, as well as a partner in the Dozier-Pressley Company; and Barton opened and operated a drug store, as well as a small town and country practice.

#### **Johnson & Tryon Eras**

The Dozier Family resided in the home through the 1870's, eventually selling to the James Johnson family, when Dr. Leonard Dozier became a doctor at the Napa Asylum. Captain James Johnson was a partner with Powell Emigh in the warehouse business at Newtown Landing. During the 1870's Johnson sailed the high seas

prior to arriving in Rio Vista. The Johnson's remained in the home for several years, eventually selling to the Tryon family during the 1890's. The Tryon's remained in the home through the turn of the century.

#### Lent & Bennett Eras

The George Lent family purchased the beautiful home in the early part of the century, raising two sons and one daughter there. One of the Lent sons, Garland, enlisted

in the United States Army during the First World War. Unfortunately, he was killed in action. His name is included with the names inscribed on the St. Joseph's Memorial Cross monument erected on the corner of South Fourth and California Streets, next to St. Joseph's Parish.

The Lent family remained in the home for several decades. The Lent's daughter married Joe Bennett and the house eventually fell into their hands. Later they passed the

house on to their son, Stanley (a.k.a. Pete). During the 1940's a new church, The Church of Christ, was established in Rio Vista. The congregation originally met at the Women's Improvement Club. During the early 1950's the Bennett family allowed the



new congregation to hold services in several of the spacious rooms on the main floor of their home.

By the 1950's the house was starting to show its age and the second floor had become structurally unsound after eighty-six years. Stanley made the decision in 1955 to tear the home down, before it fell down. For a number of years after the house was demolished, the cement stairs remained as a reminder of the grand home that once sat on the corner. These steps became the meeting place and hang out for high

school age students for more than two decades. Eventually during the late 1970's, the steps disappeared and the home was but a memory.

A few years later, a small barn was torn down, which was located on the southeast rear corner of the property. And as recently as this year, a small home that was constructed in 1938 on the rear southwest corner was torn down. All that remains of the house today are just a few photographs. One of which is a beautiful panoramic image of the home from the era when the Lent family owned the home. The photograph is on display at the Rio Vista Museum.

It's summertime and the smell of fresh fruit and vegetables is in the air. Farmers have been planting in the fertile Sacramento Delta soil since spring and the summer harvests have begun. The timing is perfect for a road trip along the Delta Farm and Winery Trail. This article covers a few of the 25 fun-to-visit wine and produce locations identified on the map. Pick it up at any of the participating farms and wineries or find it at www.sacriverdeltagrown.org.

Before leaving and throw in

home, grab the cooler some ice to cool the mouthwatering fruits and vegetables that you pick up. As you are driving out of town make sure to fill up with gas since the only gas

stations along the way are in Rio Vista and Walnut Grove. Don't forget to grab some cash as and fruit stands credit cards.

#### Are you ready to go?

Begin your journey heading North on State Route 160 along winding levee roads that curve along the Sacramento River and the sloughs. The sun beams down and reflects off the river dotted with fishing and pleasure boats of all sizes. Along the banks you may spot herons, ducks, geese and cranes. Be watchful of the road though as you may encounter slow moving farm equipment.

#### Steamboat Acres

The featured farm of the tour and the first of the founding members of the Sacramento Delta Grown Farms is Steamboat Acres located at 15989 Sutter Island Road in Courtland. Steamboat Acres was established in 1848. The farm is run by Double M Farms Tim Neuharth and his family who are fifth and sixth generation Photo: Robie Williams farmers. Tim and his family are happy to share information about the farm and their philosophy. Steamboat Acres is a Certified Organic farm that produces Bartlett, Stark Crimson and Bosc Pears and cherries and has a Chardonnay wine grape vineyard. Some of the trees in the orchards are over 100 years old! They also grow pumpkins and sweet corn. Tim is passionate about farming and loves



talking about the importance of eating locally grown foods and supporting farmers. There is also a beautiful, natural sand bar beach right on Steamboat Slough where you can swim, picnic and fish. Check out their website at www.steamboatacres.com.

#### Double M Farms

The next founding member is Double M Farms and McDowell Hunting Preserve. Charlie McDowell, Sr. established the farm in 1947. The third generation of the McDowell Family now operates the farm located at 13161 Grand Island Road in Walnut Grove. Current crops include pears, alfalfa, wheat and specialty fruits from Michael McDowell's private collection orchard. Double M opens their farm to the public, selling picked and pick your own pears. Their farm stand features peaches, plums, nectaplums, apricots and free range eggs. An upland game bird aviary at the entrance to the farm gives visitors a chance to see game birds up close. You can find more information about the farm and the hunting preserve at www.mcdowellestate.com.

#### Wallace Chan Farms

Wallace Chan Farms, Inc. is located at 11691 Highway 160/ River Road in Courtland. They are another founding member of the Sacramento Delta Grown Farms and have been farming for several generations. A point of interest on their farm is the large collection of vintage farm equipment that is on display. Their main crop is Certified Organic pears.

#### Delta Islands Organic Farm

Find Delta Islands Organic Farm at 14591 Walnut Grove – Thornton Road in Walnut Grove. J. B. and Jeanne Morais own and operate this Certified Organic farm

that specializes in heirloom produce. They offer healthy, sustainable grown fruits, vegetables, herbs and over 40 varieties of heirloom tomatoes. Early in the season find strawberries, cherries, apricots and onions at their friendly fruit stand. Mid-summer the fruit stand is stocked with tomatoes, sweet and hot peppers, cucumbers, beans, garlic, summer squash and zucchini. As fall arrives so does the winter squash and the pumpkin patch. R Kelley Farms

Another founding member of the Sacramento Delta Grown Farms is R Kelley Farms at 1120 Scribner Road, Sacramento. A true farm to fork business owned by Ron and Ella Kelley, they have been providing seasonal fresh vegetables for 15 years. Their specialties include blackeye, purple hull and crowder peas as well as green beans, garbanzo, speckled butter and cranberry beans. The farm has a variety of other crops including tomatoes, okra, sweet corn, peppers, squash and sweet melons. Their services include pick your own, "we-pick" and pea shelling. "We-picked" items are available inside their store shed. More information is available at www.rkelleyfarms.com.

#### Maggi's Farm

Maggi's Farm features Certified Organic Bartlett Pears in the pear stand of their front yard at 9821 River Road, Sacramento. William "Bill" and Margaret "Maggi" Cave purchased the farm in 1943 and it has been owned and operated by the Cave family ever since. The pear stand sells pears ripened without commercial processing and pear sauce from

their own orchard. The stand has been operated for the last five seasons by one of Bill and Maggi's greatgranddaughters.

Vierra Farms

Last on your

list of

farms to explore is Vierra Farms located at 3010 Burrows Avenue in West Sacramento. Vierra Farms is a relative newcomer having been established in 1989 by David Vierra. However, farming is nothing new to David. n.org/visit-us/guides-and-maps His grandfather Ellard Vierra was instrumental in settling the Sacramento Delta in the 1920's and farmed into the 1960's. David began with a pumpkin patch at the age of thirteen and later founded the farm and then his own produce company. Depending on the time of year the farm produces black and vellow seedless watermelons, vine ripened heirloom tomatoes, corn, zucchini, broccoli, eggplant, bell peppers, potatoes, squash, peaches, nectarines, and of course, pumpkins. In October

the farm turns into Dave's Pumpkin Patch with events and attractions for the whole family, including picking your own pumpkin m straight from the pumpkin patch! # Kayaking Delta Style Scenic Waterways and Juspiring Beauty By Naomi Walker Photos by Naomi Walker and Susan Newberg

Kayaking is a great way to get out on the water and experience the Delta firsthand.

The California Delta is an expansive inland river delta and estuary in Northern California. It is formed at the western edge of the Central Valley by the confluence of the Sacramento and San Joaquin River and lies just east of where the rivers enter Suisun Bay. The total area is about 1,100 square miles, to including both land and water.

The Delta was formed by the raising of sea level following glaciation. Since the Ice Age. geologically, the area has

existed for about 10,000 years. Much of the region sits below sea level and behind levees. With the many channels and sloughs, the Delta it is a great area for kayaking and exploring the waterways. The areas within the Delta range from vast, expansive, open water to narrow and enchanting sloughs with various species of plant and animal life.

There are a number of great put-in areas.

#### **Steamboat Landing**

Steamboat Landing is located at 12414 State Highway 160 in Slough serenity Photo: Naomi Walker Courtland on Sutter Island, across from the northern tip of Grand Isle. Grab a snack at the nearby Steamboat Landing eatery, then launch from the beach. There is a fee for beach access.

#### **New Hope Landing and** Marina

New Hope Landing and Marina is located at 13945 West Walnut Grove Road in Thornton. Once in the water, continue straight ahead, which heads up the Cosumnes River. This is a beautiful area of the river to paddle. A sharp left takes you towards Wimpy's Restaurant and Marina on the Mokelumne River,

where you can stop for a bite to eat. There is a \$10.00 per car fee for parking.

#### Kokopelli Kayak Rentals

Kokopelli Kayak Rentals is located on the Delta Loop at 151 Brannan Island Road in Isleton, in front of the Lighthouse Restaurant. Rent single kayaks for \$15.00 per hour and tandem kayaks for \$20.00 per hour at this location. The resort is closed Mondays.

#### **Suisun City Boat** Landing

The Suisun City Boat Landing is located on Cordelia Slough at the end of Kellogg Street in

Suisun near several interesting nearby eateries. The slough winds through the Suisun Marsh, which is one of the largest contiguous wetland preserves in the nation. Check the tides before you go

Naomi Walker as some areas may become too shallow for paddling. Be sure to watch the wind as well because it can be very windy and rough on some of the

sloughs. Parking is free.

#### **Cosumnes River Preserve**

Cosumnes River Preserve is located at 13501 Franklin Blvd. in Galt. Access to the Cosumnes River is about 1/2 mile from the Preserve office. Borrow a trailer from the office to walk your kayak to the water. The office holds your driver's license for security. The Preserve offers organized paddle trips with guides. For more information see http://www.cosumnes. org. There are no fees at this location.

Note, when going to sites with parking fees, be sure to bring the exact fee in cash, as most sites do not have an attendant. It is also wise to have a pencil and pen with you to denote where you are parking.
