Wind Turbines Capture the Delta Breeze

Yes, Rio Vista has wind... lots of it. Ask any resident of Rio Vista or stand on any hill in the vicinity and you'll soon experience the "delta breeze." Look to the Montezuma Hills Wind Resource Area to the west of town and you'll see over 1,000 wind turbines dominating the landscape generating clean renewable energy, creating jobs and benefiting the local economy. There are several wind farm operators in the Montezuma Hills. Discover Rio Vista interviewed Paul Copleman, Iberdrola Renewables Communications Manager, and Christopher Capra, Sr., SMUD Public Information Specialist, to learn more about the giant wind turbines (not windmills) that dot our skyline.

The State of California requires their utilities to source a certain percentage of their electricity from renewable resources such as wind, solar, natural gas, nuclear, and hydro. But there's a lot that is attractive about wind energy in particular.

"First and foremost, we're guaranteeing a long-term fixed price for our electricity," Copleman said. "We can do that because the wind is free whereas other sources of electricity generation depend on market prices for fuel. The wind is going to cost the same today as it will cost ten years from now."

The Shiloh Wind Power Plant is part of the international energy company, Iberdrola, and its U.S. subsidiary Iberdrola Renewables, which owns and operates a fleet of wind energy facilities across the country. The 100 turbines at the Shiloh plant generate 150 megawatts (MW) of electricity for Pacific Gas & Electric, Modesto Irrigation District (MID) and the City of Palo Alto Utilities customers. The Montezuma Hills were chosen

as a Wind Resource Area for many reasons, including wind speed, consistency and direction. A host of environmental factors were also taken into consideration such as impact to wildlife, habitat, and cultural resources. Additionally Copleman points out a critical factor in deciding where to build was "The ability to plug into the electrical grid and deliver our power to market."

Built in 2006, the Shiloh plant wind turbines are fairly diminutive by today's standards. However, with one of the blades at the 12:00 position, each tower at Shiloh is still 385 feet vertically. If you stood a football field upright from goal post to goal post, it would be 65 feet shorter than a Shiloh tower.

Another major player in the Montezuma Hills is the SMUD Solano Wind Farm. Currently the wind farm produces 230 MW of clean renewable power for SMUD customers in Sacramento County and small adjoining portions of Placer and Yolo Counties.

In 2012 the SMUD Solano Wind Farm completed a second phase adding 75 turbines, each behemoth is 415 feet tall with a blade tip to blade tip diameter roughly the length of a football field and blade tip speeds that can reach 200 mph.

The wind plants are not the only ones capitalizing on the delta breeze. For example, local landowners benefit too. The Shiloh plant alone leases nearly 7,000 acres from 26 local farmers or ranchers. Whether wheat or grazing land, many farmers choose to host wind plants because just a fraction of their land is actually used for the plant infrastructure.

Copleman states, "Most landowners will tell you that the footprint of the infrastructure of a wind farm, whether it's the turbine itself or the access roads, substation or operations and maintenance building, is very small and actually takes very little of their land out of production."

The terms of individual landowners are proprietary. Some lease payments, including property taxes, can total hundreds of thousands of dollars each year. The landowners hosting the Shiloh plant facilities collectively make over a million dollars each year. So, in short, wind energy is successful on many fronts. Copleman summarizes, "As we look at growing wind energy in the industry as a whole, it's no longer just an environmental success story, it's a local economic benefit success story."

Signs in Rio Vista

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
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


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Slow Food in Rio Vista by Janith Norman



Slow Food began, quite literally, as a reaction to the growing prevalence of fast food. Founded in Italy in reaction to plans to place a McDonald's outlet near the Spanish Steps in Rome, it has grown into an international movement with 100,000 members in 150 countries. It has come to represent the efforts to preserve timehonored methods of producing food, saving varieties of produce and meats from disappearing that are delicious but not suitable for industrial agriculture, and reacquainting people with the joys of well prepared meals using locally produced ingredients. The movement supports local, artisanal producers of fruits, berries, vegetables, cheeses, oils, meats, honey and other edibles. Its shorthand mission is stated as promoting "Good, Clean and Fair Food."



The California Delta is a prime location in which to celebrate and share Slow Food ideas. The rich river bottom soil has for many generations produced a huge abundance of produce of all kinds. The vast grasslands of eastern Solano County continue to produce some of the finest cattle and

sheep in the state. A more recent addition to the food scene is California Endive Farms, which produces this rare food product for the entire country. Rio Vista sits on the Sacramento River in the center of this agricultural cornucopia.



The Slow Food Chapter in the California Delta is in Rio Vista, where the fourth annual Slow Food Festival will take place on Saturday, June 20, 2015. The festival will again feature samplings of many varieties of locally produced wine from the Delta, Lodi, and Solano, Sonoma and Napa counties. Local craft beer is also poured, all to complement generous servings of delicious food. Live entertainment, presentations on food production and preparation, and food and fine art vendors make for a memorable day on the Sacramento River waterfront. The reasonable ticket price and informal atmosphere mark this festival as one of the most accessible Slow Food events in California. Third Thursday



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Bike Tour to Bird's Landing

This unique tour can be made in a car, but it is particularly suited for bicycling as it goes over lightly used roads through a landscape better seen up close. From downtown Rio Vista, it is 14 miles to the tiny town of Bird's Landing. This route has no shade for the first 8 miles, so it is best to go on a cooler day or in the morning. Even if you do not make it all the way out, a ride into the Montezuma Hills is very worthwhile for its rolling landscape in the otherworldly mix of high tech wind turbines, historic structures and equipment and ranching scenes (mostly sheep and some goats).

Starting at Main and Second Streets, head south on Second past the Library, past the beautifully restored house at Second and Bruning known as Captain Larsen's home. Continue south until just past the Delta Marina where the road splits, turning left to Beach Drive and Sandy Beach county park, or right on Montezuma Hills Road. Take the right turn at this .5 mile point and proceed past the Vineyard Bluffs development up the gentle slope. At the 1.5 mile point is Emigh Road and the McCormack family ranch on the left. You will catch your first up-close sighting of the wind turbines, whose massive size dwarfs everything else around. Continue on the main road as it gets steeper until a rest point at mile point 3.7 where it flattens out, then climbs again to mile point 6.8 at the SMUD Solano Wind Project facility where the road turns right and flattens again. The first shade of large eucalyptus trees begins at mile point 7.6. Continue on until at mile point 10.7, the road intersects with Bird's Landing Road at the Anderson Ranch. Turn left, and at mile point 12.1, you have reached Bird's Landing and the Tavern at the junction with Collinsville Road.

If the flag is up, the Tavern is open and you can go inside for a cold one and a blast

of local history. The walls are covered with memorabilia and photos going back many years and showing the town from its earliest days when Mr. Bird's landing was a shipping point on the Montezuma Slough for local farmers to send their grain products abroad. This remarkable Tavern, whose proprietor, Shirley Paolini and her family, have been serving up libations and lunches for many years, has been a true regional landmark for many generations of residents and visitors.

Another point of interest is found if you turn left on Collinsville Road to the Bird's Landing Hunting Preserve and Sporting Clays which features four skeet shooting ranges, a full service shop with hunting rifles, shotguns, ammunition and gear, and a café serving breakfast and lunch from 7 to 2 every day except Tuesday.

You can also continue down Collinsville Road, past the Collinsville cemetery (worth a look) to the very tiny town of Collinsville, another four miles, where the road ends at a levee (mile point 16.5). From the top of this levee is a panoramic view across the confluence of the Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers to Pittsburg and Antioch. This town is still recovering from a fire in July 2014 that damaged and destroyed over half the homes.

If returning to Rio Vista by car, you can stay on Bird's Landing Road without turning back onto Montezuma Hills Road and it will take you to a junction with Highway 12 at its junction with Highway 113, where you will turn right to return to Rio Vista. Bicyclists should return on Montezuma Hills Road, as Highway 12 is much too dangerous and not at all designed for bicycles.

Rio Vista is Wind & Water

Perched on the shores of the largest river in California with the famous Delta breezes during summer months, the Rio Vista region is one of the premier spots for wind and water sports. This is particularly true for the sport of windsurfing, which requires strong steady winds as well as great skill. Ranking with Maui and Hood River Oregon, the San Francisco Bay Area has several locations with the requisite conditions for first class windsurfing--but the lower Sacramento River has the fresh water and sunny summer weather absent in other Bay Area spots. The stiff summer winds provide sizeable chop and swell that windsurfers love. That is why on typical summer weekends from May to August, one can see the Sherman Island County Park at the southwest tip of Sherman Island full of families, RVs, and wind-water sports equipment of all kinds. Windsurfing is a sport that requires the knowledge and skill of sailing and surfing. Unlike the more staid sport of sailing, windsurfing brings the adrenaline rush of surfing as the windsurfer performs jumps, inverted loops, spins and other freestyle moves. The other major wind-water sport is kiteboarding, which requires less wind than windsurfing. It is more easily learned and requires less equipment that is more easily transported than windsurf equipment. This accounts for its growing popularity. Both are relatively new sports and equipment design is continually evolving and improving. Another water sport found in Rio Vista waters is stand-up paddling which is even more easily learned and does not, of course, depend on the wind. In addition to being a great core exercise, it provides a waterborne perspective superior to kayaking. You can learn much more about

these sports as follows:

The joint website for the Rio Vista Windsurfing Association and the Sherman Island Kiteboarding Organization is rvwa-siko.com. These are organizations of sports enthusiasts that promote safety, maintain water access locations, provide programs for young people and generally promote the enjoyment of their sports.

Located on Sherman Island near the beginning of the access road from highway 160 is Delta Windsurf and Watersports Co. which stocks windsurf and stand-up paddle board equipment, provides repair services and arranges lessons in these sports. Their website is deltawindsurf.com, tel: 916-777-2299.



The cyclists will then head up through Solano County and the towns of, Davis, Woodland and West Sacramento, ending up back at their starting point after a 127 mile circuit. 
