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Big Changes at Tower Park

High class resort camping arrives in the Delta

The 2019 summer season marks the completion of major new developments at Tower Park, located 13 miles east of Rio Vista where Highway 12 passes over Potato Slough.

Yogi Bear's Jellystone Park™ Camp-Resort

Known as Yogi Bear's Jellystone Park™ Camp-Resort, this recent addition to the long-time full service Tower Park Marina

is designed especially for families with kids of all ages. In addition to a full range of camping options that vary from deluxe cabins with air conditioning and full kitchens to tent camping sites, there is a dizzying array of activities for kids. These include swimming pools, a sandy beach on the slough, mini golf, a water zone, beach volleyball, playgrounds, basketball, jumping pillow, "lazy river" (a constantly moving flotation circuit), a dog park, "Hey Hey" rides, and hot tubs. These activities are included with the overnight accommodations or a day camp pass. Additional activities include Lazer Tag, arts and craft activities led by recreation staff, bumper boats and bicycles. Furnished cabana rentals near the water activities come with a mini fridge, TV and ceiling fan so day trippers have a place to hang out.



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Tower Park Marina Services

Tower Park is the only marina in the Delta with a full range of water craft for rent. These range from paddle boards and kayaks to fishing boats for up to six people, pontoon boats for up to ten people, one person electric boats and new two-person mini boats. Marina services include numerous covered boat slips of varying sizes, valet launch service, fuel and storage for boats and trailers, marine parts and services.



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Waterfront Grille — Fine Dining in the Delta

Under the guidance of Executive Chef Hascher and Manager Flora Ann Jackson, this restaurant has emerged as the premier dining spot in the Delta. The high season menu features a broad range of creative offerings. Starters range from novel items such as Black Bean and Sweet Potato Empanadas and Cauliflower Fritters to standards like Tuna Nicoise or Golden Beet salads. Lunch specialties include a Balsamic Glazed Portobello Sandwich, Baja Style Fish Tacos, and a BLT that features grilled focaccia with BBQ shrimp. Nine Chef Entrees include Prosciutto Wrapped Jumbo Shrimp with avocado salsa, Roasted Corn and Mushroom Risotto as well as Grilled Polenta and Roasted Vegetable Ratatouille. All this, in addition to pizza, sandwiches, burgers and a children's menu. There is also a popular buffet style Sunday brunch.




A large event space with a waterfront view is an attractive spot for destination events such as weddings, anniversaries, and other celebrations with an excellent catering menu at hand.





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Visit the Scenic

Why would you want to take a drive on the Delta Loop? Is it true that it's the seventh wonder of Sacramento County? Step away from the "everyday." Seemingly go back in time while enjoying beautiful scenery, great food, and fun activities – indoors and out.

Loop is part of the vast levee system created in the 1800s by Chinese immigrants in response to the Swampland Act Congress passed in 1850. Two million acres of wetlands were partitioned in California. There were 500,000 acres in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta. According to historical reports, Europeans entered the Delta back in 1772 after observing the region from atop Mount Diablo. Today, the

the Delta for being one of the States most productive farming regions.


The route, which includes restaurants, boat harbors, RV parks, cabins, kayak rentals, and a sailing school, begins at Highway 12/ Jackson Slough road when traveling east or Highway 12/ Brannan Island Road. When traveling west, continue for 10 miles and you find yourself on winding levee roads that are filled with beautiful views and wonderfully hidden sights. Among them, see waterfowl, beautiful trees, pampas grass, ice plant, cattails and dramatic views of the horizon with the Montezuma Hills, Antioch Bridge and Mount Diablo to the west.

You would not guess by sitting on Highway 12 in traffic that you are on the last piece of dry land for many miles, but the Delta

region is enjoyed by many for its beautiful waterways that have created areas for recreation. Farmers appreciate

Some special things about the area are businesses for adventure such as the Delta Sailing School, which is the only sailing school on the Delta. According to owner Alan Klee, the school has something for everyone, experienced or not. If you have drifted away from sailing and want to get back into it, they can help by offering rental use of a sailboat and experienced teachers. Delta Sailing School has the capacity to teach under an array of conditions to help you become competent in sailing. They sail the Delta and beyond to the big waters of the San Francisco Bay. Another fun adventure awaits at the Kokopelli Kayak rental business, found as a floating Tiki Hut at the Lighthouse restaurant. Even first-time kayak enthusiasts can safely enjoy this fun activity. Kokopelli Kayak rents kayaks by the day, the hour or the weekend. You can take off on your own or go on what they call a pirate run that takes you behind the marinas out to the San Joaquin river, ending up on a beach. Endive Experience Don't Miss This Festival!

Endive (pronounced on-deev) is one of the most difficult vegetables in the world to grow, requiring a two-step process before it is ready to be enjoyed. The first growth takes about 150 days in the field, where the chicory plant grows from seed into a deep root. Tops of the leafy plant are then cut off, roots dug up, and placed in cold storage, where they enter a dormancy period. As demand necessitates, roots are removed from cold storage for their second growth, which takes 20 to 28 days in dark, cool, and humid "forcing rooms" similar to mushroom growing. Thus, endives are available year-round, from California Endive Farms in Rio Vista.

To experience this first hand, Rio Vista Lions Club hosts the well-known Endive Experience each year in June — a special event to raise funds for multiple projects that

benefit local residents. Those attending the event have an opportunity to tour the various rooms where endives are forced from root to lovely crisp leaves. 

6th Annual Rib and Chili



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Peter Cook Historic Home - Part 1

One of the grandest homes to be built in Rio Vista is the former home of Peter Cook. Located at the corner of Main and Fifth Streets, the two-story brick home was once the host of stately black-tie affairs attended by a variety of state appointed officials.

Although well over a century old, the elegant Cook home is remarkably well preserved. This is a testament to the craftsmanship of the builders, whom Mr. Cook hired to construct the original home and the extensive remodel, which it received a decade after construction. Another consideration is the love and affection for the home by each of its owners.

To get a real sense of the style and design of the house, one must learn first about the man who contracted to have it built to fit his family's needs. Peter Cook was born in New Brunswick, Canada to Neil Cook and Mary Currie. The Cook family left New Brunswick in October 1867, arriving in San Francisco on December 23. It was not long before the family arrived in Rio Vista and settled down. The Cooks bought property and built a home a few miles northwest of town, near Duncan McCormack, Robert Watson, and Peter and James Hamilton. It was on this property that young Peter grew up and obtained his interest in ranching and farming.

Peter did leave Rio Vista to complete his education at Hopkins Academy in Oakland. Then he returned to Rio Vista. Eventually he took Miss Julia Mastin Proctor as his wife, and from this union two children were born: Peter Jr. and Julia. Peter Jr. was born in 1898 and passed away in 1970, while Julia was born in 1892 and passed away in 1900.

During these early years the Cook couple and their children made their home on the family ranch. On December 5, 1905 Peter bought property from Eugene Blanche Naulot Schneily for the sum of \$10.00 on the southwest corner of Main and Fifth Streets. Mr. Cook erected a small but modest single-story home. For the next decade the Cook couple and their son enjoyed the home and life in Rio Vista.

After the devastating floods of 1907 and 1909, Mr. Cook spent a good portion of his time researching and educating himself in river control. He felt there was a definite need for this type of approach. He campaigned to educate farmers and ranchers in the area as to the necessity of a comprehensive plan for river control.

He was appointed to the position of Vice-Chairman of the San Joaquin-Sacramento River Association. The organizers, or pioneers of this project, were Peter Cook, John Irish, V.S. McClatchy and Alfred Anderson. Governor Hiram W. Johnson appointed Mr. Cook to the State Reclamation Board in 1912, a position that he held for some time. It was Peter's keen interest in reclamation, river control and improvement that gave him the background for such a position. However, he always held the interests of the farmer first and foremost in his decisions.

Mr. Cook also had an interest in financial institutions. He was one of the organizers of the Bank of Rio Vista, which was chartered in April 1904. He held the position of Vice-President of both the Midlands Land Company and the Sacramento Land Company, was a director of the California-Western States Life Insurance Co., and the manager of the Lathrop Alfalfa Land Company.

His many interests also included education, which he held in the highest

regard. When the Rio Vista Joint Union High School was established in 1912, he was instrumental in helping to purchase the land from Felix Drouin for the new school. He was on the Board of Trustees of the Rio Vista Joint Union High School for many years, serving as both a trustee and as president.

Peter Cook always considered himself a rancher, by vocation. This is apparent in his listing in the "Index of Registration of 1910," which lists his position as "rancher." He was a great asset to the town of Rio Vista, and always had the best interests of the farmers and citizens of Rio Vista and the area closest to his heart.

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In The Net With Fish'n Dog Drew

Water Impact On Inland Chinook Salmon

The February 2018 report from the Pacific Fishery Management Council stated the Fall-run of the Chinook salmon was “overfished.” Fishery managers consider 122,000 to be the minimum number of spawning adult fall-run salmon necessary to sustain the Sacramento River’s salmon population. The 1976 Magnuson-Stevens fishery law requires that regional management councils establish rebuilding plans for fish populations that have been declared “overfished.” Despite several amendments to clarify the act over the years and a failed 2017 Congressional House Resolution attempt to replace the word “overfished” with “depleted,” the rebuilding plan continues to focus only on fishery limits, without looking at inland environmental conditions.

At the California Department of Fish and Wildlife 2019 Salmon Information Meeting held in February, it was reported the Sacramento River Fall Chinook Adult and Jack Spawning for 2018 was 105,739 Adults and 41,184 Jacks. This is a rise in the numbers reported for the three previous years, but still below the numbers reported in 2012 – 2014.

Was this rise due to the fishing limits? No, not entirely. One of the underlying issues for a healthy Chinook salmon fishery is the availability of good water flows for salmon as they migrate to lay their eggs. Rainfall impacts the annual run off into our creeks, streams, and rivers, especially the Sacramento River. California had drought years in 2014 – 2015, followed by a return to normal rain conditions (actually 4.30 inches above the average) in 2016, but in 2017 saw the return of drought conditions. The California Department of Water Resources reported below average precipitation for Water Year 2018. Water years run from July 1 through June 30.

Marc Gorelnik, a member of the Pacific Fishery Management Council, was quoted in a March 19, 2018 article about the drought and the way the United States Bureau of Reclamation managed water flows for plunging salmon numbers: “In 2014 and 2015, they were supposed to impound enough cold water behind Shasta Dam for the fish and they did not. Instead, the agency released so much water from Lake Shasta early in the year that, by the time the salmon had returned to the Sacramento to spawn, the lake’s cold water was gone – delivered largely to Sacramento Valley rice farmers. This proved lethal for the fish’s temperature-sensitive eggs.”

Tens of millions of fertilized salmon eggs were reported killed in 2014 and 2015, when the sun heated water –

warmed to lethal temperatures for the eggs – flowed for weeks out of the severely depleted Lake Shasta. Shasta is located a few miles upstream of prime Chinook spawning grounds.

In 2017 California’s population grew to 39.54 million people. The state population has more than doubled since our last dam was built to provide storage for the State Water Project or Federal Central Valley project for Farms and Cities. This creates a large supply vs. demand problem in California, which impacts the necessary flows in the Sacramento River and other waterways, needed to sustain the Inland Chinook salmon fishery.

Our previous article outlined the 2015 Coleman National Fish Hatchery trucking program to release Chinook smolts near the ocean. This method was used to avoid unacceptably high levels of juvenile fish mortality that could have resulted in 2015. Robert Clarke, Fisheries Program Supervisor for the USFWS Pacific Northwest Region, stated on 3/23/15, “Trucking juveniles drastically increase straying and reduces adult returns to the Upper River and hatchery. However, if we were to release our fish at the hatchery under the current drought conditions, it is very likely we would not get enough adults back to meet our egg needs three years from now.”

Once these smolts were released by trucking they faced additional challenges once in the ocean. Unusually weak wind systems multiple years in a row curtailed deep-water upwelling, resulting in almost no plankton and krill for the young salmon to eat. They starved upon reaching the open ocean. The impacts of limited water, and limited food created the perfect storm, impacting the potential survival of

this hatch of Chinook salmon.

In 2017, around 3,000 Chinook salmon returned to Coleman National Fish Hatchery outside of Anderson, California. Each female salmon lays an average of 5,000 eggs. That run was only enough to fertilize about 6 million eggs. Coleman’s goal is 12 million eggs per year and is generally the state’s most productive salmon hatchery.

Thoughtful management of water flow in California’s river and careful placement of hatchery released salmon, combined with any necessary fishing limits are needed to maintain California’s Chinook salmon population. Additionally, common sense decisions regarding water storage balanced with demands must occur.

Until next time, “remember to keep those fishing lines tight”. Boonie, the river dog, and Drew hope to see you on the water this summer.

Cannabis 101

CBD and THC explained

New businesses are breaking ground in the Delta. Rio Vista is becoming home to a hub of cannabis companies – from indoor farms, extraction facilities, and recreational shops. Our community varies from the weekend hobbyist to those seeking the healing aid of cannabis.

CBD, cannabidiol, is just one of over a hundred phytocannabinoids, a part of the cannabis plant. CBD is safe and non-addictive. CBD is also related to the phytocannabinoid tetrahydrocannabinol (THC), the compound that produces the “high.”

In the case of healing, THC acts like a “window” and CBD is the “breeze.” THC opens our CB1 receptors (primarily found in the brain and central nervous system) and CB2 receptors (commonly found in peripheral

organs, especially cells associated with the immune system) to let in CBD; CBD then can find where it is most needed.

CBD and THC impact us by mimicking and augmenting the effects of the compounds in our bodies called “endogenous cannabinoids” – so named because of their similarity to the compounds found in the cannabis plant. These endocannabinoids are part of our endocannabinoid system.

The more THC you have in your ratio the wider you open the “window,” the more CBD “breeze” comes through to interact with your CB1 and CB2 receptors. However, each patient’s endocannabinoid system is different. Some patients respond best to CBD (with or without THC), while others may find that micro-dosing THC is their best medication.

Putting it generically, CBD and/or THC can aid in treatment, acting as an anti-inflammatory, nerve suppressant and/or mood stabilizer. Studies have shown CBD and/or THC has been helpful for patients with cancers, fibromyalgia, epilepsy, Crohn’s Disease, chronic pain, anxiety, stress and depression. CBD and/or THC can also function as an alternative for opiates, as well as treating general pain management of arthritis, worked muscles and more.

CBD and THC can be found in many forms of use. Tinctures are most common, a sublingual oil application that goes under the tongue then is swallowed.

There are also capsules and tablets, edibles (usually a candy) or smokeables, either as raw cannabis flower or in a processed, concentrated “vape” cartridge.

With all applications you’ll also find CBD and THC is available in many “weights” or ratios. There is full CBD (canna or hemp derived) that comes in mg denotations from 50mg up to 2000mg. Then you’ll find ratios from 30:1 to 1:10, the first number is designated for CBD and the second number is designated for THC. Exact testing numbers are displayed on all cannabis market items.

What may work for your friend, may not work for you. Cannabis is to be treated like any other pharmaceutical. There is a learning curve and it is to be respected. Though there is no ability to over-dose to the point of permanent harm or death, it is still a very uncomfortable feeling to take too much. Always, discuss what is best for you by visiting your local “budtender” (a person who sells cannabis in a legal establishment), with any additional questions about how CBD or THC may be able to help you and where to start.




