

We highlight some of our "Hometown Heroes" — local workers, businesses and school district who helped Rio Vista meet challenges posed by the pandemic. We focus on a few, but salute all who play a role in supporting our community.

DELTA PHARMACY

Delta Pharmacy at 407 Main Street emphasizes customer and employee safety. There are plastic partitions at the registers, employees wear masks and often gloves, and counters are cleaned continuously.

According to owner and pharmacist Ken Wudel, store traffic has slowed down since COVID-19. "You can't blame them. Everybody's trying to stay safe."

While people may not be coming in to shop like they used to, there are notable exceptions. For example, there's been a constant shortage of puzzles. "It's hard to keep them in stock because the puzzle companies also ran out." Ken also notes, "Kids are home so we sell a lot of toys."

Hiccups in the supply chain continue to cause some product shortages. At the time of print, hand sanitizer is in stock but rubbing alcohol is in short supply.

On the other hand, prescriptions have stayed steady and deliveries are up... way up. Averaging around ten daily prior to COVID-19, the Pharmacy now makes 30 to 40 deliveries a day. About this free customer service Ken notes, "We deliver anything that they want. It's not only prescriptions. If it's creams or toys or gifts, we'll deliver anything to help them out."

The Pharmacy is known for great customer service. Cynthia G. on Yelp writes, "Love this local pharmacy. They are small town friendly yet fill prescriptions efficiently and correctly. Pharmacists are always eager to discuss prescription medications as well as answer my questions and offer suggestions for over the counter items."

The Pharmacy also provides other convenient services such as pneumonia, shingles and flu vaccines, and last but not least, free beautiful gift wrap for all regularly priced items.

LIRA'S SUPERMARKET

Rio Vista and surrounding Delta communities are very fortunate to have a full service supermarket to provide all its food and household needs. In ordinary times, Lira's carries nearly 25,000 items. A total of about 50 employees keep operations running smoothly, including a meat and seafood department, a full service deli counter, and delivery service. Abundant bakery items are provided by numerous vendors, including specialty and local bakeries. Sushi is made fresh daily on site and there is a large variety of "ethnic" foods. Shoppers find everything they need to meet the demands of the most adventurous foodie, and when a specialty item is requested, the staff gladly orders anything obtainable through their vendor network. Cooking, baking and household items needed to keep a household running and in good health are well stocked. Prices are very competitive with the large supermarket chains like Safeway and Raley's, and Lira's carries many sale items featured in its weekly on line and Beacon newspaper ads. The key difference is that Lira's is rooted in the community it serves in a way that chain stores are not.

The Lira family has run the supermarket since 1990 when Jim Lira, his wife Shirley Lira and their partner Bill Dutra bought the store from its previous owner. Jim Lira inspired the store spirit and direction from the beginning, with a strong commitment to family, employees and the community. Many community volunteers attest to the generous support that Lira's provides, just for the asking, to local schools, non-profit organizations and service organizations in Rio Vista. Shoppers all experience the genuinely

friendly and helpful service that this community spirit engenders.


When the lock down hit us all, the importance of Lira's supermarket became especially clear to our community – especially our elderly. The store responded immediately, carefully following health guidelines. With the help of city Public Works employees, Trilogy staff and volunteers, and additional hired employees, the store ramped up its delivery service to meet the demand that had more than quadrupled. At press time, Lira's is planning to implement an on line shopping option. The total number of employees has expanded to about 70.



RIVER DELTA UNIFIED

Responding to the state mandated 2019-2020 school closure after the mid-March shut down, River Delta Unified School District Superintendent Kathy Wright expressed gratitude for the impressive level of commitment and collaboration generated to address the plethora of challenges to offer fair, accessible, and affordable distance learning and meals to students all over the Delta. staff, teachers, parents, students community organizations, administrators, and service businesses have come together to "build the plane in flight." Teachers especially have been actively engaged in finding solutions and providing support for students of all ages.

A whole new design and support structure for instruction and assignments online was required. This included researching and resourcing compatible age-appropriate platforms, providing suitable internet devices and in-home access, creating WI-FI hot spots, and connecting and supporting students.

Special in-car events and online recognition were organized for graduating middle school and high school students. Social-emotional support was provided through the RDUSD website and personal outreach.

Food prep staff continues to prepare bagged meals for lunch and breakfast to support over 500 students daily. Available for pick up, some meals are also delivered to homes by principals, administrators, and even the superintendent.

The District begins the 2020-21 school year August 12 with a distance learning-only plan and continues to face many ongoing challenges. To help, donate directly to a local school or write your congressman to support school funding.

RIO VISTA FOOD PANTRY

As Rio Vista Food Pantry volunteer Richard McDevitt says, "Versatility, adaptability, and trust, along with my faith in God have been my friends this year. It feels good to be able to give, keep the faith, and help work towards a positive outcome."

The Food Pantry's working board has conquered many unique challenges during the COVID-19 pandemic. Volunteer activity was reduced due to the closure of the office, individual health

concerns and the "shelter at home" mandate. Quickly adjusting to the new rules and restrictions, the Pantry restructured to a few small teams. Weekly farmer's market distribution changed to pre-packaged food by masked and gloved volunteers. Clients now line up and drive through in their cars to accommodate social distancing.

RVFP's sources are the Solano and Contra Costa County's Food Bank (State, County

and USDA), and Lira's, Walmart, Raley's, Trader Joe's and Bimbo's Grocery Recovery Programs. Wednesday's dry goods are received and packaged. Bread, produce, meat and dairy are bagged on Sundays.

The Pantry provides for residents in the 94571 zip code, however, no one that needs food is turned away. The maximum

income levels have increased. Call (707) 374-5706. General food distribution is Sunday from 12:30 pm to 2:00 pm. Senior Disabled Delivery is the first and Third Sunday from 3:00 pm to 4:30 pm. Pantry's Closet's client distribution is the first and third Sunday from 12:30 pm to 2:00 pm.

Volunteer Yvonne Camper says, "I'm amazed at the 100% volunteer staff's dedication. Clients are gracious and pleased to see us, thanking us, and for some we are their only outside contact."

This year with COVID-19 restrictions, donations are the Pantry's key source of income. Through September 30, the Travis Credit Union Foundation matches donations up to \$20,000 total. Go to

RIO VISTA HOLISTIC HEALTH CENTER Writer: Susan Whitesell

Arriving in town seven years ago Darrell and Jeanne Brown's reaction was, "What, no medical care? We've got to change that!" Darrell is a FNP-BC (Family Nurse Practitioner – Board Certified) and his wife Jeanne is a RNC-BS (Registered Nurse, Certified –Bachelor of Science). According to Darrell, "We retired from Kaiser so we could open up the practice because we wanted to do family medicine, country doctor type stuff, in a town that we lived in and give back to the community."

Among its traditional family medical services the clinic provides prescriptions for acute and chronic conditions, onsite blood draws, laceration suturing, joint injury splints, school, work and sports physicals, and chronic non-opioid pain management.

In addition to family medicine, the clinic provides holistic procedures such as laser and low-level light therapy for pain control and body sculpting, Pulsed Electromagnetic Field Therapy to reduce pain and chronic inflammation, photobiomodulation and neuroplasticity entrainment for treatment of neurological and psychological conditions, traditional Chinese medicine cupping for pain control, and auricular therapy to treat chronic pain and a variety of health issues.



Rio Vista Service Clubs have enriched the community in many ways, such as providing scholarships to graduating seniors, contributing to city projects, honoring our first responders and other projects too numerous to list. All of this requires fundraising. Unfortunately, during this pandemic and quarantine, these clubs have all had to cancel events and reevaluate priorities. Here, we cover how our service clubs have fared, what the future might bring, what services they are offering now to those in need, and how those more fortunate may be able to help out if so inclined.

American Legion Serving Veterans for over 97 years, the American Legion, Post #178 has 240 active members. The pandemic has prevented the post from renting out the renovated Veterans Hall for more than 25% of their capacity, or fewer than 50 people. This has severely cut into their income. The Post is developing plans for some activities in the future. Look forward to the 6th annual Kinser Golf Cup October 9 with online reservations and sponsorships.

Habitat For Humanity (American legion Post #178/ Berkeley Food and Housing Project) All of a sudden the new Vets home has walls and a roof! With local building trades offering labor, the house got off to a good start last September. Then came COVID and work stopped with the pad and framing done. Habitat worked with a contractor pool to bring the building to where it is now. They are hoping to finish the house by September. However, additional funding is needed from the community.

Meals On Wheels Solano County This program is critical for many shut-ins in Rio Vista. The noon communal meal at the Senior Center has been shut down during the COVID crisis.

Rio Vista Lions Club has supported many projects through fundraising efforts. During the COVID quarantine, the club had to cancel its weekly meetings and most events for the entire year. Manning the Fireworks booth with the RVHS Boosters was a major exception. The club has resumed weekly meetings Tuesdays at noon outdoors at The Point Restaurant and was able to distribute its annual scholarships.

Rio Vista Rotary Club has supported many projects in Rio Vista, including awarding scholarships to graduating RVHS seniors. However, major fundraising events had to be cancelled. The new local Rotary President has called for resilience and to reconnect as a club. They have started meeting Friday mornings outdoors at The Point Restaurant and are planning events they can do during the pandemic.

Soroptimist International of Rio Vista Although COVID has prevented the club from meeting, they were able to award their numerous scholarships at a special awards ceremony at the High School football field, and they managed to create a terrific "Sip In Place" fundraiser that was very successful. After their summer hiatus they meet at the Highway 12 Diner one evening a month.

Women's Improvement Club One of the oldest service clubs in Rio Vista, they have contributed annual scholarships to graduating RVHS seniors. They hope to be able to meet in the Fall.

Rio Vista High School Booster Club The Boosters provide critical support for all RVHS extra-curricular activities including sports, clubs and the arts. They were able to hold their very successful Dinner Dance in January and shared the Fireworks booth with the Lions Club.

Youth Services Unfortunately, all activities have been cancelled for the foreseeable future. Current social distancing requirements make it difficult to have a sufficient number of youths in the facility.



Safe-Distance Dining with Rio Vista

1892 DOWNTOWN FIRE

In the summer of 1892, the community of Rio Vista was still an unincorporated town. One of its privately owned companies was the Rio Vista Water Work, owned and operated by Robert C. Carter Jr. Carter was also the driving force behind the establishment of the Rio Vista Hook and Ladder Company during the early 1870s. During that time frame fires were still being fought primarily by axes and bucket brigades.

Up until 1892, the worst catastrophe to strike Rio Vista was the devastating flood of January 1862, which necessitated the relocation of the town to its present site. Unfortunately, thirty years after the flood, a fire would take place destroying a large portion of the town.

The downtown fire of 1892 destroyed virtually every business from Front Street up to Third Street and from Montezuma Avenue to Sacramento Avenue. A total of 75 residences, sheds and business buildings were destroyed. Eighteen families were rendered homeless. In just three hours the fire caused two hundred thousand dollars' worth of damages.

At 11:20 am on Wednesday, July 20, 1892 Miss Emily Dobbis discovered flames in the rear of the second floor of the River View Hotel (currently the Rio Vista Hotel). Miss Dobbins ran screaming down the hotel stairs and into the street, gaining the attention of several men who ran into the building and turned on the hotel The brick Bruning Building and the back of the Riverview Hotel located on the corner of Main and Second Streets. fire hose. Unfortunately, the fire hose was dry.

The Rio Vista Water

Works system laid out in town had been made from used, rejected pipe, originally intended for steam boilers. It was said that Mr. Carter had been known to pay the young boys of town twenty-five cents every time they located a leak in the pipes around town. Some of the young boys, eager to receive payment, were known to make a quarter just by poking a stick through the thin pipes. The water system had long been outmoded and its ability to deliver water for even the most routine fire was not good.

The majority of the Bruning Building and all of the Hotel

were destroyed.

With a north wind and most of the building's downtown being wooden, the outcome of a fire in mid-July did not look promising to the townsfolk. When the water supply ran out fireman, citizens, and ranch hands from the surrounding area were pretty much helpless. Everyone worked together to try and remove goods and furniture from the doomed buildings. Several of the buildings were saved: the Russ House, located between Front and Second Streets, and E.M. Chase's Store, standing on the southeast corner of Main and Front Streets (the present site of Lucy's Restaurant).

On the northeast corner of Front and Main Street stood one of the few brick buildings that managed to escape the fire. This structure was a saloon owned by Fred Bachasson, called the Montezuma Hills Vineyard and Wine Cellar. Inside the building were numerous barrels of wine stored in the basement.

When the flames started to get close to the building, the men headed down to the basement and broke open the wine barrels. Then they proceeded to pour the wine on the walls of the building.

been lost.

The River News devoted its entire front page to an account of the fire. "Had a fire of this magnitude occurred in the night, it would be difficult to estimate the number of fatalities that must necessarily have followed," the News said, "and the people of Rio Vista must be very thankful that it occurred at a far more opportune time in the day." The news continued, "It is not within our power to mention the names of those who assisted in saving property and helped to extinguish the fire. But people from Isleton, all the islands and from Birds Landing, besides nearly all the threshing crews in the county and the many ranchers in the immediate neighborhood flocked to the assistance of the town, and we can assure them all that the good people here return them many thanks for

their kind assistance.'

Among the many acts of kindness performed at the time, The News mentioned one on its front page, "George Brann of the Canright District brought in a box of 36 dozen eggs to be distributed among the needy. This was a thoughtful act on the part of Mr. Brann and is deserving of the highest praise.'

This was truly one of the saddest days in Rio Vista's history, but if there had been a lesson learned, it was that the city needed a better water works system.

Upon reopening, walk into the 2nd St. Gym at 40 North 2nd Street and you are greeted by owner Kelly Graupensperger or one of her friendly staff. Your temperature is taken and tracked. After sanitizing your hands you are handed a sterilized bottle of disinfectant and an individual cleaning towel. If you haven't been in for a while, you are asked to sign a waiver that addresses COVID-19 precautions and patron expectations such as cleaning protocols and face mask use.

Employees take similar precautions upon arrival, taking and tracking their temperatures and wearing assigned face coverings and gloves. The new check-in procedure is just one of many changes to the gym in response to COVID-19. Automatic membership payments were suspended and a three month gratis period added to all memberships to account for COVID-19 closure.

All gym equipment and surfaces are sprayed down with a solution of bleach and water disinfectant each morning, noon, and night.

New air filtration systems "scrub" and recirculate air both upstairs and downstairs. Three new UV lights sanitize bathrooms and heavily used areas, such as the annex, where spin classes are held. Equipment has been spaced six feet apart, giving both floors a refreshing openness. Barriers are erected between stations where separation is unachievable.

Gym hours are 5:00 am to 9:00 pm Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 6:00 pm Saturday, and 10:00 am to 6:00 pm Sunday. The gym is closed for cleaning from noon to 1:00 pm Monday

"We know that demand is going to stay steady. It went up and now it's plateaued. Now we're making sure that we have enough stock so the supply chain issues can work themselves out."

Will said, "Our sales in lawn and garden have been astronomical." The store has suffered severe shortages of potting soil and mulch and manufacturers have not been able to keep up with demand. Trying to project for demand and making sure that everything is stocked in the store, and that our vendors can fill the products we're ordering – that's been the greatest challenge."







As part of our ongoing series about RioVision, we share the projects, programs and events that RioVision has done to fulfill our mission statement of joining together to build, revitalize, energize and beautify the Rio Vista community.

RioVision's first large endeavor was the Main Street Planter Project. The project was paid for by selling inscribed pavers. Involved volunteers re-did each of the 77 Main Street planters with new irrigation, soil and plants. After completion, this became a program named Trim 'N Tidy to provide upkeep for all

the planters.

Murals created and painted by RioVision volunteers include the old tavern scene on the side of Books RioV, the 9/11 mural at the Rio Vista Fire Department, the blacksmith shop at the Rio Vista Museum and the youth center wall. Our volunteers refreshed the Hap's Bait mural and smaller murals painted on benches by local students.

The first event hosted by RioVision was the Holiday

Home Tour in 2015. Funds raised by the event were donated to the City for the floating dock that was installed in July 2018. The Holiday Home Tour has become a bi-yearly event happening in odd years.

The first large outdoor event was the 2016 Party on the Promenade. An interpretative sign describing the history of the waterfront was installed. The net profit was earmarked for the Promenade Shade Cover Project that is ongoing having just completed Phase I. The Promenade Walkway also showcases the Hamilton Memorial Project.





A community garden was built at RE:Church in 2016. Unfortunately, the site was not easily maintained and was dismantled. RioVision learned from this experience and went on to create the Riverview School Garden benefiting the middle school children. Produce grown is donated to the Rio Vista Food Pantry.

RioVision and Soroptimist joined together for the Sheepdog Trial at the McCormack Ranch in 2016 followed up with a repeat performance in 2017.

The original organizers of The Hog August Bites Rib & Chili Cook-off handed the reins to RioVision to organize in 2017. Our fundraising for this annual event has helped Rio Vista

> Boosters Club purchase vans for the high school and supplemented the Promenade Shade Cover project. Both the 2020 Sheepdog Trial and Hog August Bites events were canceled due to COVID-19. Early Thanksgiving morning brings the Turkey Trot coordinated by RioVision. Funds raised benefit the Rio Vista High School Cross Country team.

Other RioVision events include the Party at the Park, grand opening for the skate and dog parks and short silent movies performed with musical accompaniment on the antique Wurlitzer.

Repainting the curbs downtown, hanging holiday decorations, the bike racks in front of the Rio Vista Bakery and Bank of Rio Vista Bank Administration Building, the table in front of Pizza Factory, benches at the dog park, the

installation of gutter covers, planters redone and maintained at the Rio Vista Library, maintenance of the lights in trees along Main Street, upkeep and replacement of the flags at the foot of Main and the Western Entrance are all courtesy of RioVision volunteers.

The clinic now performs COVID-19 testing. Jeanne says, "We've had a really full schedule with the COVID testing and also with the antibody testing." In the case of possible COVID-19, the initial consultation is always done over the phone to determine if testing is appropriate. "We don't want really sick people like that in the clinic. We go out to the car to test them." Recently, according to Darrell, "We're seeing more businesses that are requiring COVID testing to see if their employees are actually sick and they're repeating those tests every two weeks. That's put a different spin on what we do from a lab standpoint." COVID testing is typically done in the morning to enable lab pick up at 2:00 in the afternoon.

The clinic recently added stem cell therapies, used to address medical issues such as joint pain, COPD, autoimmune disease, diabetes and Parkinson's. Often given as an injection, for example to treat joint pain, stem cells may also be administered intravenous, and soon, inhalable.

With respect to their clinic Jeanne and Darrell agree, "We just want to give back to the community, not just in medicine, but the whole part of being a community."

The City of Rio Vista continues to provide city services through the pandemic. Although all city office lobbies are closed, the staff are there answering the phones and emails and conducting city business. A video detailing plans during the pandemic is narrated by Mayor Kott and displayed on the Rio Vista Comcast Cable Channel and on the city website. The city implemented the Emergency Operation Center with Fire Chief Jeff Armstrong at the helm in early March. More information may be found on the city website at riovistacity.com. Sign up to receive text message updates from the city by texting "Hello" to (855) 907-2229.

Rio Vista Fire Chief Armstrong leads the Emergency Operation Center. An experienced EOC coordinator, he met the task head on starting in February, updating the city's emergency preparedness plan. Activated at Level 3 on March 12, with three staffers working part time at both the EOC and regular city positions, the EOC was in business. The three areas of primary concern are public information regarding COVID-19 and the city's response, Contingency Planning for preserving continuity of services to protect, serve, and govern the community under various possible scenarios, and resource management and preparation logistics such as protective equipment for emergency personnel.

The **Rio Vista Police Department** finds that policing during a pandemic requires adjusting to changing mandates from all levels of government. The police department is there to educate when it comes to wearing masks or responding to complaints about businesses that may not be complying with new logistics such as protective equipment for emergency personnel. Based on Best Practices and Risk Management Models, Rio Vista submitted a re-opening plan to Solano County a week before the County had their plans in place. State, County, and City plans have since lined up. The EOC was ready to assist businesses with the reopening, all while still providing fire and emergency services! Additionally, the fire department staff assisted Lira's with delivering grocery orders.


