# SThe Legend of Afte


They began humbly in 1964 under the name "The Medallions," debuting at a Dorris, California pizza parlor "just to see the reaction of the people to our sound," says original lead singer and guitarist (and current Rio Vista resident) Gene Resler. After changing their name to "Afterglow," the group would go on to create a classic psychedelic album now treasured by connoisseurs of the genre.

Not released until 1968, their self-titled album was begun after the group went into hiatus for most of 1966, when some band members attended Yuba College in Marysville while another member attended Chico State. The band resumed

musical activities while working on their degrees, and by Fall of 1966, began recording in San Francisco on what would become their legendary album with Leo Kulka at Golden State Recorders.

The album is now a well-recognized gem of mid-1960's West Coast "soft-psych" harmony sound: contemporary with, and reminiscent of the likes of Beau Brummels, the Association, Byrds, Buffalo Springfield, Left Banke, Turtles and the more experimental side of Beach Boys, with a nod across the pond to the Beatles and Zombies. But unlike the preceding bands, Afterglow also flirted with Kesey Acid-Test/Warhol Factory-tangent avant-gardism at a time when contemporary bands, such as Red Crayola, Fugs, Velvet Underground, Godz, The Mothers of Invention, and West Coast

Pop Art Experimental Band were likewise newcomers. Other 1960's bands noted today among genre-aficionados specifically for taking such experimentation to extremes, such as Fifty-Foot Hose, did not emerge until after Afterglow's album was released.

Gene states that, "Afterglow was a band that progressed after the album was released and added new members as we continued our music as a dance and show group playing upgraded hotel lounges, Reno and Tahoe, and was booked on a Military Base Circuit for NCO and Officer Shows all over from California to Hawaii." Gene, Ron George (the original and current bassist/backing vocalist and Elk Grove resident), and original drummer Larry Alexander continued to perform on the road until 1974.

Interest in the heretofore obscure California group was revitalized in 1995 when retro-specialty label "Sundazed" bought the Afterglow master tapes from Leo Kulka's Golden State Recorders archive and released it on CD to critical acclaim. Six years later, the company also re-released the album on vinyl. Subsequently, PBS produced a special about the band. Gene noted, "We had no idea that our album would ever receive the recognition that later happened down the road."

The current trio finds a recent change to the group lineup. Whereas the band has been performing with a keyboard player and a programmed drum machine, the current lineup features live drums from music industry veteran Jim Weyeneth of Rio Vista.

Gene reflected on Rio Vista audiences and Rio Vista itself, "There's a certain peacefulness that brings one to Rio Vista. If you can't watch a sunrise or a gorgeous sunset and not be impressed, I don't know what it will take. Beauty is in nature, music, and all the other wonderful happenings in Rio Vista. I believe Rio Vista has a huge heart for giving with all the charitable fund raisers and work behind the different non-profit organizations that are represented. How can you not say that these people are the very best audience anyone can have!"

Afterglow is featured at the 2021 Bass Festival in Rio Vista as the opening act on the main stage, Saturday October 9th, 11:00 am to 1:00 pm. The band has two pages on Facebook, "Afterglow 1968" and "Afterglow Trio 1968." The latter deals with the current band, the former with the classic band. 

#### **Peter C. Bradbury**


Peter C. Bradbury has written seven novels to date:






**Consequences** – After years of suffering, a young man deals with those who bullied him along with the bullies of others.


The Innocent Children – Often ignored, trafficking of children in the USA is a big problem that is only too real. Children are bought, lured, taken and sold... with few happy endings.

#### **Molly McIntyre**


What Are They Doing? – A childs fun book of animals and actions that helps develop speech and language, developed by the author, an experienced Speech and Language Pathologist.



There is a lot of wonderful, surprising art to see in Rio Vista. Some are easy to find just by walking around. Other art has to be searched out. There are murals, signs, sculptures and more. So, wander about town to see what you can find.

the Rio Vista High School art classes under the direction of former RVHS art teacher Ryan Pace, with assistance from local residents and Trilogy activists. The flag facing the river is in memory of 9/11.

The mural on the Rio Vista Museum on Front Street was designed and painted by Harvey Steinhaus, a talented Rio Vista watercolorist, assisted by a Rio Vista High School student, and supported by RioVision.

Hap's Bait mural, a fantasy of the Delta, has been in place for many years and was updated by Linda Solomon and Richard Laswell a few years ago also under the auspices of RioVision.

The historical representation of the saloon and barber shop on the side of Books RioV on Second Street and Main was designed by Linda Solomon based on the original uses of the building and painted by a large team of local artists. The Barber Shop was painted mostly by Amy Schmidt. This mural was the first of several sponsored by RioVision.

Walking up Main Street to the Rio Vista Fire Department, view another tribute to 9/11 featuring a reproduction of the famous photograph of firefighters with the flag after the fire as well as a piece of a girder from the World Trade Center. This mural was conceived and painted by Linda Solomon and Amy Schmidt and sponsored by RioVision. Take a short walk down the parking area on the right side of the firehouse to the beautiful historic mural of the original firehouse trucks and staff painted by Nick Styles, formerly a Rio Vista High School art student and local artist.

A second mural by Nick Styles needs a bit more searching. Walk along Second Street from the Pizza Factory towards the Library and peek down the alley to see the mural along the side of the Emigh building honoring the long history of sheep ranching in the Montezuma Hills.

Well off the beaten track are the beautiful mosaics by the High School art students, also under the guidance of Ryan Pace. The mosaics are along the driveway from 4th Street by the student parking lot. One of the mosaics was commissioned by Nadine Pennick as a memorial. These are well worth the detour – they are amazing.

Not only are there murals on the buildings in town, but a few local businesses also have lovely art in unlikely places. Walk into Pets4All on Main Street and ask to peek into the back yard at the mural on the face of the metal building. (Note: this is behind the dog grooming studio so it may not always be available to view.)

The mural at the Taqueria on Main street by Ryan Pace's students, is unexpected; it is on the ceiling! Try looking from different aspects – fascinating!

The building now housing AJK Emporium has been through several lives. Starting out many, many years ago as a theater it has been at various times a church and a real estate office. At one point the owner repainted the art deco walls and ceiling originally in the theater building. Next time you are shopping, take a look – it is gorgeous.

On Highway 12, Tortilla Flats has a new mural representing a Mexican town. It is charming and adds greatly to the ambiance.

There are several other types of art to see in Rio Vista.

Two of the historic neon signs have been completely refurbished: Fosters Bighorn and The Striper Cafe. Hopefully, the old Rio Vista Hotel and Flamingo sign can be done in the future.

Walk towards the river on Main Street just past Lucy's to view the sign on the Youth and Community Hall. This installation was designed by Linda Solomon using graphic figures as an inspiration, cut by Lira's Welding, and painted by Linda. This artful endeavor was also sponsored by RioVision.

A beautiful, unique art piece is worth a visit to the Promenade. The kinetic sculpture is a memorial to Donna Hamilton from her husband David and best friend Raye Hansen, and is also sponsored in part by RioVision. The sculptures, designed by metal artist Lyman Whitaker, represent the wind, and are titled Star Dancer, Double Helix Sail, and Single Helix Oval. The landscaping was designed by local architect John Bento. It is especially beautiful at dusk with a rising moon in the background.

These are but a few of the artworks to be seen about town. There are more, including painted utility boxes, benches, newspaper boxes and a delightful rock garden outside the firehouse. Just spend a day rambling and looking to find these artistic gems. Enjoy!



# ARCHITECTURE ASART

Dan Rice, the 19th century man of many talents once said, "there are three forms of visual art; painting is art to look at, sculpture is art you walk around, and architecture is art you can walk through."

The city of Rio Vista has several styles of architecture lining its streets. Many of our earliest structures were either destroyed by fire or removed for more modern structures, during an area of modernization and an attitude of "out with the old, in with the new." There are, however, a few examples of Victorian, Craftsman, Tudor, Gothic and Mission style architecture still standing.

#### **Victorian**

Victorian architecture became popular in the mid-to-late 19th century. It received its name, from the style of architecture designed during the reign of Queen Victoria in Great Britain.

Rio Vista has a couple of homes that reflect this era of design. Most prominent would be the former home of Captain Lars Peter Larsen, located on the corner of Second Street and Bruning Avenue, as well as the contemporary homes of James Sullivan and Jesse Thomas.

Described as late Victorian, the 1897 Larsen home is

considered one of the most beautiful homes ever built in Rio Vista. The home was constructed in the fashion of the day: brick foundation, wood framing, and lathe and plaster interior walls. Captain Larsen, being wealthy, was able to purchase the best of materials. Also, by owning a lumber company, he was able to hand pick all the best lumber. The woodwork was constructed of all redwood with beautiful hand painted graining. The floors were all hardwood with decorative trim strips. The fireplace was Italian marble. Two very noteworthy exterior items are the widow's walk atop the home, the Queen Anne corner tower, and the carved decorations under the gabled eaves on the verge boards.

The 1899 Thomas home was constructed of the finest redwood available. It was easy to get since Sullivan and Larsen Lumber Company was located in Rio Vista on Front Street. The 3,843 square foot, three-story, ten-room home included a large living room with fireplace, kitchen, breakfast nook, formal dining room with three built in hutches, and six bedrooms but only one bathroom.

The home is considered a Victorian with characteristics of the Queen Anne style, popular during the era of its construction. Queen Anne style is categorized by the heavy use of decorative gingerbread woodwork and the original balustrades.

The home is a Victorian, featuring a gabled dormer with fixed sash and multi-pane sidelights, fish-scale shingles, bay windows, horizontal siding, transom light above first floor window, stained glass sidelights on each side of the front door, eaves brackets, lattice work, balustrade, tower, and ornate decorative woodwork.

#### **Craftsman**

One of the more popular architectural designs for builders in Rio Vista's past is the American Craftsman design, inspired by the arts and crafts movement at the turn of the century. The style put emphasis on the skill

or dexterity of the carpenter and/or builder. There are many examples of these homes in the older portions of Rio Vista, on the south side of Main Street.

Craftsman homes could be of various square footage and either single or two story. Some of their most notable characteristics are the tapered columns, which support the roof, covered front porch, and exposed rafter tails.

#### **Tudor Revival**

During the 1920s and 1930s Tudor Revival architecture became exceedingly popular across the United States, second only to Colonial Revival. Tudor was recognizable for its steeply pitched roofs, with front facing gables or multi-bed gables, and

half-timbered wall surfaces. The exterior was almost always stucco with a side or front chimney, diamond shaped casement windows and an arched or round entry door.


The Harry Stewart home constructed in 1932 at 450 South Fourth Street is an example of Tudor Revival. The living room was a step down from the formal entry and featured a fireplace and large front window. The dining room had a beautiful oak built in hutch. Throughout the home was hardwood flooring. One bathroom featured green ceramic tile with black trim.

The exterior featured front facing gables, a steeply pitched roof covered with wood shingles, false half-timbering employed as decoration, brick wall on the ground floor with stucco wall

treatment on the floor above, tall, narrow windows with multiple glazing, and an entryway with a roundtopped arch.

#### **Gothic**

Two features of Gothic Architecture in churches are large stained-glass windows and increased height, which are both found in St. Joseph's Parish Catholic Church located on South 4th Street. The church falls under the style of architecture referred to as Carpenter Gothic. This beautiful 1904 church features stained glass

windows, each with inscriptions dedicating the lancet windows. The building follows the cruciform floor plan formed by the intersection of the nave, chancel, and apse with the transept.

#### **Mission Revival**

Mission Revival was an architectural style that became popular in the late 19th century and continued through the 1920s. It drew its inspiration from the Spanish missions of California. The style became quite popular in institutional structures, such

as schools, as well as being quite common in railroad depots and churches. The style was also popular in residential homes.

Examples of Mission Revival style in Rio Vista are the Windborn

Church, located on the corner of Main and Third Streets, and the Bruning School, (now called River Delta Unified School District Office), located on Montezuma Street. The Windborn Church was erected in 1919. The building's exterior walls are finished in stucco with a red mission-style roof, low pitch, hipped roof, open eves with exposed rafters, and multi curved gables with parapets. The Bruning School was dedicated in 1929, in memory of Joseph and Gertrude Bruning, the first benefactors of Rio Vista. This Mission Revival style stucco schoolhouse is currently the oldest standing public school building in Rio Vista.

Like many small towns across America, the homes and buildings in Rio Vista reflect several different eras with a diverse representation of artful architectural styles.









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# More Talented Local Artists






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
