THE ICONIC A BIGHORN

There was no fanfare, nor big announcements, just a yellow Public Notice of Application for Ownership Change sign in the window of Foster's Big Horn that meant change was imminent. In September, the keys quietly exchanged hands, as Foster's Bighorn kept serving food and pouring your favorite drink. And so this iconic business continues.

The recognizable neon sign and the lights are brightly lit. It is a welcoming beacon on Main Street. The glass doors and large front window have been blacked out, now sporting the Foster's logo, giving it a finished, upscale appearance. As you walk in, your eyes are drawn to the bar, sixty-five feet of polished wood and the herd of animals that adorn the walls. The lighting fixtures have been changed, shining a soft brightness throughout.

The bartender smiles and welcomes you as you walk back to the

dining area. With the removal of one of the booths, it is more open and inviting. Plus, it is easily accessible for wheelchairs and walkers.

Chris Wakeman, the new owner greeted me, and we went up to the mezzanine, closed the louvered doors and sat down for a chat. Chris has been living the Delta life for many years. First as a weekend boater and then purchasing the land near where he tied up the boat. During Covid, he moved in permanently, although his business took him back to the Bay Area.

When asked what prompted his purchase of Foster's Big Horn, he said "I was taught to reach beyond what I'm comfortable with and I love the Delta." He wants to keep Bill Foster's vision alive, as well as the memories. The photographs that line the walls document Bill's life as he traveled and hunted big game in Africa, Canada, and Alaska. Times were different

back then and Bill brought the exotic back to people who had never seen, nor would they have without him. Chris enjoys hearing people's stories about the restaurant and the old days. He also intends to follow the three previous owners in preserving the collection.

Chris has worked in the restaurant and hospitality industry. He meets with the staff asking for their input and involving them in keeping Foster's an icon.

Many of Foster's favorites are still on the menu, including the Wednesday night prime rib special and the Friday lunch specials. Chris intends to make more changes to enhance the experience. Effective In July Foster's began closing on Mondays through the summer for maintenance (except nationally recognized holidays such as Labor Day). They will also ramp up the improvements, building on changes they have already made.

Of course, preserving Bill Foster's legacy for generations to come is ongoing!

75th Annual Bass Derby and Festival "Through the Years" October 13, 14, 15

The annual Rio Vista Bass Derby and Festival is the oldest fishing contest in the state and is filled with wonderful memories, a proud history, and so much family fun and entertainment!

EARLIEST HISTORY

In 1933 the proposal for the striped bass fishing derby originated with Phil Ross of Redwood City and Harry Proctor of Oakland. Both were newspaper men. The Rio Vista Chamber of Commerce and other city leaders were instrumental in helping them to develop and organize the event. In that very first year there were1,300 anglers entering the semifinals and of those 160 competed in the finals. The winning fish was 29.8 pounds.

In September of 1934 at the second Bass Festival there were 3,720 anglers and over 5,000 visitors. The entertainment consisted of a dance with the music provided by the Al Wittenbrock's orchestra. There was also a performance by a 50-piece band called the Sacramento Pyramid of Sciots.

In 1935 there were 9,000 anglers and 27,000 visitors. That year there were parade floats with the Boy Scouts and Fire Department participating. The Fishing Derby winner was Young Corbett II who was an ex boxing champion.

By 1938 more activities were added such as a BBQ, open air concert by the Rio Vista Band, a softball contest, motorcycle races, and boxing exhibitions. Finally, there were performances by various dance groups and "Jack Cleary's" Kiddies Dance Troupe.

From 1939 to 1948 the Bass Festival was suspended due to World War II and its aftermath. When it started up again there were other changes in the entertainment and activities. The Beauty Pageants began during the 1950s. The parades were expanded to include horseback riders, and horse-drawn carriages. Water skiing on the river was also a new activity for festival goers.

Much has changed over the intervening years, yet the true spirit of the festival lives on. The following contains the 2023 Fishing Derby information and festival daily schedule at the time of print. Always check the newspaper or online closer to the date of the event for the most current information.



THE RIO VISTA MUSEUM Rio Vista's Hidden Treasure Chest, Part Two

t was lucky for the City of Rio Vista that in 1975 a group of seventeen local citizens gathered to discuss the feasibility of establishing a museum in the city and formed the Rio Vista Museum Association. Some of those citizens had been involved in the Centennial celebration fifteen years earlier.

The group agreed that the purpose of the association would be to collect, safeguard, and publicly display documents, photographs, and objects of historical significance to the city of Rio Vista. The

time was right to open a local museum to coincide with the country's 1976 Bicentennial Celebration.

In September 1975 officers of the Rio Vista Museum Association elected Genevieve (McCormack) James as the association's first president. As the news of the association got around town, members of the community contributed a variety of historical artifacts. Little by little, images of pioneers, houses, businesses, and steamships from Rio Vista's past covered the walls. Most of

the items brought in were easily identified, however there were a few that were not, and in some cases the museum did not know what to do with some of them. During those early years, Krug Dunbar was the curator at the museum. If an object had a label, Dunbar would often write to the manufacturer to inquire about its history. Unfortunately, some manufacturers no longer existed, and he could not find contact information for them. Times have changed and the internet has made it much easier and faster to date and acquire information about an item. You still need the name of the manufacturer and an idea of what the item is, but the almost immediate response time from internet resources accelerates the process.

Luckily for the museum association, the historic blacksmith building, located on Front Street was empty. Most recently the building had been an auto parts store. The committee looked the building over and unanimously felt that it would meet their needs. It was a historic building more than large enough to accommodate the artifacts that had been arriving, and it was in a central location.



The museum opened its doors for the first time during the Bass Derby in October 1975, manned by a group of enthusiastic volunteers. With ample space, the unique collection spread throughout the building, There was overwhelming support that weekend and from that time the museum has continued to grow. In 1978 the Rio Vista Museum raised enough money to purchase the historic building for \$33,510.

As the collection expanded so did the need for space. The first phase of expansion was the rear display room, reading room, and upstairs

archives, and the second expansion created the side farm room.

Throughout the years since the opening of the museum, members and former members of the community have helped the museum become what it is today, through their support. The Rio Vista Museum Association is a private tax-exempt 501(c)(3) corporation led by a board of directors elected annually by the membership. The museum receives its financial support entirely from memberships,

memorials, donations, and fund-raisers, such as the annual Hamburger Feed and various open houses. Your membership will help in the continued preservation and exhibition of the distinctive history of this lively community.

Each year the museum hosts several highly anticipated events: The Olde Tyme Christmas Faire (hard to believe but the event has been around for fifteen years), Mad Hatter's Tea Party, and the Rio Vista Museum Hamburger BBQ, which has been held for longer than anyone can remember.

The museum offers a variety of great gift items for sale including T-shirts, coffee mugs, and an assortment of books written on local history. Also available is the Rio Vista Museum Calendar, which contains wonderful historic photographs depicting the town's past. Another fun item to pick up is 2021's *"A Self-Guided Walking Tour of the Historic Homes of Rio Vista."*

Three years ago, the museum created 24" x 36" poster boards made up of photographs of military veterans of Rio Vista and displayed

> them around town for Veterans Day. The great response to the veteran posters led to the addition of fifteen more poster boards depicting "then and now" photos of town.

> These are just a few ways of inducing individuals to stop in and support the museum. The museum is open Saturday and Sunday from 1:30 to 4:30 pm Tours are available by appointment, please call (707) 374-5169. he Rio Vista Fire Department has a community support group called the "Hot Shots." The Hot Shots was formed by a group of community volunteers in 2015 and is a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization. Currently, the organization has fourteen active Hot Shot members. In 2022, the Hot Shots raised over \$50,000 in support of RVFD. In collaboration with the Rio Vista Professional Firefighter's Association, the Hot Shots also assist in other unique events including the annual "fire truck rides." The mission of the Hot Shots is to continue to support the Rio Vista Fire Department by assisting with staffing at public events, and by fundraising to assist with improving the level of service.

The Hot Shots have provided, through fund raising, such things as an AED for the Senior Center, water stations and an updated telecommunication system at our local high school, a water rescue boat, water rescue training, an incident drone, mini medication vaults, Lucas tools (automatic CPR machines), and

most recently thermal imaging cameras for use by Rio Vista firefighters. This year the Hot Shots hope to provide scholarships for the required EMT training for new firefighters and additional rescue equipment.

The September fundraiser supports the Hot Shots efforts to update, replace, or fund new contributions to support Rio Vista's courageous hometown heroes.






