DISCOVER THE WORLD OF Geocaching Story by Robie Williams

Geocaching is a modern-day treasure hunt that combines outdoor adventure with technology. It involves using GPS devices or smartphones to locate hidden containers, known as geocaches, which are placed by other participants. This activity has grown into a global phenomenon, with millions of geocaches hidden in over 190 countries.

How did geocaching get started? On May 2, 2020, tens of thousands of GPS receivers around the world were upgraded instantly and accuracy improved exponentially. This enabled people to



find the location of items or themselves with pinpoint accuracy.

May 3, 2020, David Ulmer, a computer consultant tested the accuracy by hiding a container near a navigational target in the woods near Beavercreek, Oregon. The container held a logbook, a pencil, videos, books, software, and a slingshot. The rules were simple using the navigational "address" that was posted on an internet GPS user group find the container, log your find, take something if you wanted, but you needed to leave something behind, and it was off to the races to find the hidden item using only a GPS receiver.

Rio Vista contains a few geocache sites. Not always in a container, but some are easier to find than others. If you're curious, read on to discover how to get started in this fun activity and find the Rio Vista sites.

To start geocaching, you'll need a GPS-enabled device and a free account on a geocaching website, such as *Geocaching.com*. Once registered, you can search for geocaches near your location. Each geocache has a set of GPS coordinates and a description to help you find it. Geocaches come in assorted sizes and shapes, from tiny magnetic containers to large, camouflaged boxes.

The excitement of geocaching lies in the hunt. Each geocache is a hidden treasure waiting to be discovered. Some are cleverly disguised, blending seamlessly into their surroundings,



while others are placed in scenic or historically significant locations. The challenge of finding these hidden gems adds an element of adventure to your outdoor activities.

Inside a geocache, you'll typically find a logbook where you can record your name and the date you found the cache. Some geocaches also contain small trinkets or toys, which you can take as a souvenir, provided you leave something of equal or greater value in return. This practice of trading items adds a fun and interactive element to the experience.

Geocaching is more than just a solo activity; it's a community-driven adventure. Geocachers often share their experiences online, posting photos and stories



of their finds. There are also geocaching events and meetups where enthusiasts can connect, share tips, and embark on group hunts. This sense of community fosters a supportive and engaging environment for both beginners and seasoned geocachers.

Geocaching offers numerous benefits beyond the thrill of the hunt. It encourages physical activity, as it often involves hiking, walking, or even climbing. It also promotes exploration and discovery, leading you to novel places you might not have visited otherwise. Additionally, geocaching can be a great educational tool, teaching participants about geography, navigation, and the natural environment.

If you're interested in trying geocaching, here are a few tips to get you started:

- 1. Create an Account: Sign up on a geocaching website to access the database of geocaches.
- Choose Your Gear: A smartphone with GPS capabilities is sufficient for beginners. More advanced geocachers might invest in a dedicated GPS device.
- 3. Start Small: Begin with easy-to-find geocaches to get a feel for the activity.
- 4. Respect the Environment: Follow the "Cache In, Trash Out" (CITO) principle by picking up litter during your hunts.
- 5. Have Fun: Enjoy the adventure and the opportunity to explore unfamiliar places.

Geocaching is a fantastic way to combine technology with outdoor exploration. Whether you're looking for a new hobby, a way to stay active, or an adventure for the whole family, geocaching offers something for everyone. Happy hunting!

The more adventurous event attendees may try to master the 40-foot-long blow-up obstacle course or scale a 25-foothigh climbing wall. For those who prefer their excitement while sitting down, there will be a mobile video game van.









This is just a glimpse of the excitement awaiting attendees during the three-day Rio Vista Bass Derby & Festival. From Friday,

through October 11th Sunday, October 13th, you will be able to lose yourself in free, live music along the picturesque Sacramento River. There will be a lineup of nine great bands onstage: River Ratz: Angela Street Band; The Grinders; Groovy Judy Band®; The Fabulous CruiseTones; Afterglow; Vegas McGraw™; Garratt Wilkin and the Parrot-heads; and the Derek Abel Band™. They will be rocking the Starlight Stage until the festival closes each night.

This year, event organizers have added an extra touch of magic by launching the fireworks from a barge floating in the middle of the Sacramento River. Thanks to this addition, the fireworks display will be accessible to all shore-side visitors.

For a special small-town experience, be here on Sunday. Main Street will shut down from 11:00 am until noon on the 13th for the festival's hometown parade. The parade will feature colorful floats and entries from various local clubs and civic organizations. The fire department trucks and police cruisers always draw a crowd, and this year, Shriners International will make a splash with their zany sub-sub-compact cars joining in the parade.

Jon Mazer, the retiring Chief of Police for the City of Rio Vista, will be proudly recognized as the parade Grand Marshal. After 28 years of dedicated police service, the residents of Rio Vista extend their heartfelt congratulations and best wishes to him and his family as they begin their much-deserved retirement.

The parade organizers are also delighted to have the "Heart and Soul of Rio Vista" service award winner, Archie Thompson, at the head of the parade with Chief Mazer. Archie moved to Rio Vista in 2020 and formed The Rio Vista Litter Pickers, a group of conscientious citizens who volunteer every month to remove litter that has been carelessly tossed out of passing cars. io Vista might be considered a small town when compared $ar{\mathbf{N}}$ to the other cities in Solano County, but the people living there have big hearts. Just look at the number of nonprofit organizations in town, the people involved, and the good these organizations have done for the town and the people living there.

Take RioVision, the nonprofit responsible for this magazine. A group of volunteers put this magazine together. Why? Because they love the town and the delta life surrounding it. Sharing information is important, whether it's history or current events. Besides the magazine, RioVision's volunteers have been working for ten years on projects which improve the town for its residents and visitors. Hosting fun events like Hog August Bites and the Holiday Home Tour.

There are nonprofits that support critical services such as the Rio Vista Hotshots who volunteer with the fire department and the Citizens Assisting Police Services (CAPS).

There are organizations helping the youth of the community such as Rio Vista Athletics, Rio Vista Little League, Rio Vista Friends of the Library with summer reading programs, Rio Vista High School Booster Club, Rio Vista Swim Club, and Rio Vista Youth Services.

On the other end of the spectrum, the Rio Vista Citizens for Seniors runs the local senior center, where events and services assist that sector of the population. And no one goes hungry in Rio Vista thanks to the Rio Vista Food Pantry.

Besides feeding the body, Rio Vista Care addresses the state of the mind, providing counseling, crisis intervention and support groups for families and children.

The Art and Music Center provides art and music lessons to those who may not have the opportunity to do so on their own, plus they have brought wonderful concerts to the community to enjoy.

An important part of downtown is its museum. This treasure of history is made possible by the Rio Vista Museum Association.



We can't forget the veterans who have made this county great, and the American Legion Post #178 is the place for veterans to meet and support one another and their families. The American Legion Post #178's Veterans Memorial Building has been utilized for many

events conducted by other nonprofits for their own fundraisers.

There are nonprofits focused on helping women and girls in the community such as the Women's Improvement Club of Rio Vista, and Soroptimist, providing scholarships SOROPTIMIST



to help women and girls in the community get ahead in life. There is even a nonprofit to help our four-legged friends, RV 2 the Rescue. This group saves dogs and finds them new loving homes, even flying them to their new life.

There are local groups such as the Rio Vista Downtown Association and the Rio Vista Foundation focusing on the viability of the town itself and supporting activities of the youth and seniors.

In addition to all the organizations mentioned so far, Rio Vista is home to some major national and international nonprofits such as the Rio Vista Lions, the Rotary Club of Rio Vista, and the Moose Lodge. Each of these groups supports many people and projects in the



community.

There are even more organizations and groups within the community, such as the many churches, who contribute to the well-being of the town and its citizens.

Jan's first foray into art was through painting – first oils and then acrylic. Jan began seriously practicing photography nearly 40 years ago when she moved to the Bay Area from Sacramento. After taking a couple of courses at the local community college, she started

working exclusively in black and white film and ultimately had her own darkroom – in her bathroom. Her genre of choice was small area landscapes with interesting shapes. Jan met her husband Gene in 1985 and moved on his boat. No more darkroom. So, Jan switched



gears and began using color films. She and Gene began the first of many trips both on his motorcycle and by car. She started specializing in landscapes and would bring home at least 12 rolls of 36 exposure film to be processed after every excursion. The era of digital photography expanded her potential, so she ditched film for digital that she could process on her computer.

Jan became fascinated with the small pieces of landscapes, though she continued to try to get interesting viewpoints of somewhat stan-

dard scenes. She began looking for interesting segments of buildings, trees, rocks etc. One of her favorite places to visit was the Monterey/Pacific Grove area, particularly the Monterey Bay Aquarium. Over the years, and many visits, she determined how to take moving animals in a dark habitat using no flash. As her cameras improved, so did her pictures, and her most satisfying achievement was a good picture of a mola mola, one of the two heaviest known bony fish in the world.



After moving to the Delta in 1995, Jan started specializing in photos of this area. Originally, Jan and Gene lived on the Loop – the land of stupendous sunsets. She commuted to Sacramento for work, usually via the river roads. She would explore different roads coming home and often rode the ferries in the summer. She made note of places to pull off and take pictures. In recent years, Jan became interested in mixed media and assemblage using ideas and pictures from travels with Gene. These were a lot of fun, though done mostly for her own enjoyment and have not been shown much; that may change. Age has somewhat limited both the desire and ability to make frequent forays into nature, but she still tries to get out, particularly to photograph the winter birds that congregate in the Delta. Jan's artist reception is October 19 from 3:00 to 5:00 pm.

Randolph Robinett is the November artist of the month

Over the last 60 plus years, Randolph Robinett has been deeply involved with various forms of artistic expression. The creative process of bringing something from nothing has been a source of inspiration, surprise and sometimes frustration. He has explored a wide range of artistic styles from realism to abstraction in

both 2D and 3D mediums. In 2D Randolph worked in materials as oil, watercolors, acrylics and ink. In 3D he explored the wonders of marble, bronze, wood, plaster, cement, and clay.

Academically Randolph had the opportunity to study under several notable instructors at the University of California, Santa Cruz, particularly within the Sculpture Department. This experience fostered a lifetime love



of bronze casting, mold making, and working with marble. Later in Oregon, he had the good fortune of further developing this interest when he managed a small foundry, further exploring various materials and exhibiting them in local art forums. Having lived overseas for several years his work was exhibited and collected by various patrons.

Most recently Randolph has been working in clay drawing on Asian aesthetics, particularly the Japanese concept of natural simplicity and irregularity known as wabi-sabi. Randolph stated that "Creativity for me, is a combination of moments in time that beg, declare, and summon our base instincts and reveal their greater side."

Then a new all-volunteer organization begins in a small town with a long history, its survival is far from assured. RioVision and this Discover Rio Vista magazine both began in 2014, and the fact that both continue ten years later show that they are both needed and appreciated. The origin of RioVision was with a whirlwind project from the American Institute of Architects that sent a team of experts in planning, development, architecture, transportation, design, landscape architecture, community design and community revitalization known as R/UDAT (Regional and Urban Design Assistance Teams). For four days in February-March 2014, this team held two very well-attended community meetings and numerous smaller meetings to gather information and present findings. They worked day and night to create their report titled "RioVISION: Coming Together", which became the blueprint for all RioVision activities. All new RioVision project proposals must show how they are justified and supported by the R/UDAT report. The full R/UDAT report may be found at www.riovision.net.



The settlement that became today's Rio Vista began in 1858 (see Phil Pezzaglia's Images of America Rio Vista, 2005, Arcadia Publishing for a detailed history). A number of today's residents are descendants of the earliest settlers and bear the names of numerous legacy families. Recent housing developments including Homecoming, Vineyard Bluffs, Trilogy, and the Liberty Island projects, have more than doubled the city's population. With such diversity of living experience in the city, the "coming together" part of the vision has been especially important. This challenge has been addressed by moving ahead with projects that have broad appeal and being consciously open to anyone with ideas and energy to make them become a reality. Working together on a project does wonders to bring people together and build a sense of community.

Another way RioVision has pursued coming together is by serving as an umbrella for smaller programs such as Litter Pickers, the Turkey Trot Thanksgiving run, and the Delta Hwy Coalition, and by partnering with other nonprofit and social service organizations. In a small city with limited resources, the work of non-governmental organizations (NGOs) is critical to providing programming and services that residents need. By working together, NGOs can magnify the beneficial impact on the communities they serve.



From the beginning, RioVision has benefitted from the energy and creativity of many Rio Vista artists. They created murals in downtown locations and organized an art gallery that continues to display the work of local artists and is open five days a week. They also spurred the adoption of the city's public art ordinance that created a fund to support more public art. The first project using this fund was the decorated sheep project on Main Street that livens and attracts attention to this commercial area.

Large public events bring people togeth- HOG AUGUST BITES er in a big way, not only to attend the events, but especially by gathering the people and resources together to put on the events. The grandmother of all Rio Vista events is of course the Bass Derby and Festival, now in its 76th year and put on by the Chamber of Commerce. RioVision took over the other big event known as Hog August Bites Chili and Rib Cook-off from its founders and just



completed its 10th year. RioVision launched its Riverfront Arts Fest in 2024 and will continue in 2025. The Sheepdog Trial event that gathers sheepherders and their dogs from around the US for a spring competition in the Montezuma Hills' McCormack Ranch. RioVision coordinates the public attendance of this fun event that is currently scheduled to return April 4-5, 2025. RioVision's Holiday Home Tour, an ever-popular tour of decorated private

residences will return in December of 2025.

As it begins its second decade, RioVision continues to pursue its mission of "joining together to build, revitalize, energize and beautify the Rio Vista Community."

Many of us remember when electric trolleys and streetcars dominated the downtowns of our cities. Many cities, such as San Francisco, still have them as an important piece of their transportation system. Others, such as Sacramento, have brought them back, linking outlying neighborhoods and towns to the downtown.

As electric trains and trolley systems have closed and their cars left to decay, the Bay Area Electric Railroad Association (BAERA) has, since 1946, sought to preserve and protect this history and to foster interest in electric railway cars and operators. BAERA bought a number of the historic cars and other artifacts as they went out of service to protect this rich history. As their collection built up, a permanent site was needed for the collection.



The Sacramento Northern Railway was incorporated in 1921 and ultimately bought out other smaller railroad lines to establish a route running from San Francisco to Chico with sidelines to Fairfield and Vallejo as well as Colusa and Woodland. A stop was created just east of Suisun City known as the Rio Vista Junction, and buses ran to Rio Vista and beyond in the Delta until 1940.

After many years searching for a site to house their collection of historic railroad cars, in 1960 BAERA selected and purchased 21 acres at Rio Vista Junction to create a museum. The first cars were moved to the site in 1961 and the first electric operation of the cars began in 1965. In 1993, the Union Pacific donated the 22 miles of former Sacramento Northern track, but the museum had to purchase all the rail and ties on the right-of-way. The track owned by the museum runs from Montezuma in the south to Dozier Road in the North.

Finally, in 1994 the first phase of re-electrification of the Sacramento main track was competed and some public operations began. Thirty years later, the museum has expanded not only the train cars they repair but activities and amenities for the public. The beautiful Museum building and archives includes display hall, the Museum Store, the F. M. Smith Memorial Library, and the Depot Café. There are currently 3 car barns with a 4th being built as well as a large maintenance and repair facility.

Come Ride The Rails!!

A very large and enthusiastic group of volunteers not only repairs the cars – some almost from the ground up–and runs new electric lines along the track, and operates the cars on weekends for the public. The Museum is open on Saturday and Sunday from 10:30 am to 5:00 pm. Passengers board the trains in front of Car Barn 1 for a scenic ride through farmland to Pantana and a view of Mt. Diablo, a 9+ mile round trip. In addition, passengers have the opportunity to wander through two of the barns to see all the different cars that generally are just for viewing. You even might find one from your town or city. Its always an adventure.

In addition to the train rides, there is Laflin Park, a shady grassy area with some tables but ample lawn. A new place to explore is the Signal Garden that features a number of railroad signals that you can operate with the push of the button. Kids (and adult kids) will love this.

There are special events throughout the year. These events not only provide a ride on a restored car, but offer additional activities for the entire family. The following are special activities for August through December, in addition to regular weekend rides.

Hot August Rails: August 17, from 10:30 to 5:30. The fun includes train rides, a car show and a wine and beer booth.

Annual Pumpkin Patch Festival: October weekends starting October 12 th . Take a train to Gum Grove, a shady area with lots of activities. Explore the hay fort, zoom down the zipline, take tractor rids, participate in the scarecrow contest, or try pumpkin chucking. If you get hungry, try the tasty BBQ, and more. This is great fun for the whole family!

Holiday Express: Fridays to Sundays in December, beginning December 6. Hop on for a magical train ride, then visit Santa's House of Lights where Santa himself will be waiting. Holiday Fun is all around you!


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
